Are you ready for a "new" library? We are working on new services and programs to improve your experience at the Library (two of which are featured on this page). Stay tuned throughout the upcoming year and look for the red "new" banners!

NEW YEAR, NEW LIBRARY CARD

We're excited to announce that we will be updating our library cards in the new year. The new card includes the traditional wallet card as well as a keychain card for your convenience. Stop by the Circulation Desk to get your new card beginning January 2. Please bring your current ID and old library card with you.

1000 BOOKS BEFORE KINDERGARTEN

Reading to your young child is critical to his or her literacy development and readiness for kindergarten. Beginning January 2, we're offering 1000 Books Before Kindergarten to families with children who are birth through age 5.

While 1000 books sounds daunting, it's only:

3 books a day for 1 year = 1095

10 books a week for 2 years = 1040

1 book a day for 3 years = 1095

You decide the pace - just finish before your child is due to attend kindergarten. You may even complete the program multiple times. Any and every book counts - even if you re-read favorites.

At registration you'll receive a canvas bag, and to encourage your child, we'll award a sticker each time you complete 100 books. Once you've reached 1000 books, you'll earn a book to keep. And, any reading done for this program counts towards Winter Reading (see below)!

WINTER READING *Treat Yourself To a Good Book*

We're doing something new this year (see a theme here?): You decide how many books you want to read. There is no log, only entry slips into weekly drawings for gift cards and other prizes. So, the more you read, the more chances you will have to win. You can read one book, or 20 - it's up to you! Everyone receives a treat at sign-up and at the end, all of the entries will be entered into grand prize drawings for each age group (adults, teens, independent readers, and read-to-me kids).

Sunday, December 7, 1:30-3 pm



Ages 3-6 with an adult. Explore science with your child by conducting an experiment. We will hear a story and have fun testing ideas scientifically.


Have to Have a Habitat**Friday, January 16, 10:30-11:15 am**
