## SCIENCE KITS FOR PUBLIC LIBRARIES GRANT

The Cary Area Library is proud to announce that we have been awarded a grant from the Chicago Section of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) for the creation of science kits and science related programming. We have begun putting together science kits that can be checked out for use at home. We have also scheduled science programs this fall and have started a science club for kids in grades 3-5 that will meet once a month on Tuesdays and feature a different theme each month. Our grant will kick off with a program from The Science Alliance called *Zap*!

#### Zap!

#### Saturday, September 13, 10-11 am

Grades K-8 (children under nine must be accompanied by an adult). Hands-on interactions featuring the hair-raising Van de Graaff generator and the exciting buzz of the Tesla coil will get kids charged up about electricity! They'll build a human electric bridge, help demonstrate how electricity flows and how circuits are created and broken. Registration is required.

#### Welcome to My World - Preschool Science Sundays, September 14, October 12 1:30-2:15 pm

Ages 12 months-2 with an adult. Spend some time with your preschooler in a fun-filled science based storytime that will inspire your little ones to learn about the world around them. Please register all attendees; limit of 15.

#### Wired for Science Club Tuesdays, 5-6 pm September 23 – Rocket Science October 21 – Go Green! November 11 – Exciting Electricity

## WIRED FOR SCIENCE KITS

Beginning in October you will be able to check out seven different science kits complete with supplies, lesson plans, experiment manuals and guides.

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#### Make It Go! Kit

Students will build and explore machines and mechanisms, investigate motorized machines, calibrate and capture wind, and study gearing mechanisms.

**Snap 500 Kit** (recommended for grades 3 and up). This kit will allow students to build over 500 projects in electronics related to transformers, relays, 7-segment LED displays, transistors and diodes. Also learn about series/parallel circuits, and AM/FM radios.

**Snap Rover Kit** (recommended for grades 3 and up). Have fun building your own Snap Rover using colorful Snap Circuit parts, no soldering involved. Once completed, you will be able to navigate with a remote control.

**The Hair Raiser Kit** (recommended for grades 6 and up). The next best thing to lightning bolts! 200,000 volts of electrostatic energy.

#### Go Green Kit

Learn about energy sources and how to think green, plus learn how the electricity in your home works. Students can build a solar airboat, windmill, puppy, and two different planes.
