FRIENDS OF THE CARY AREA LIBRARY (FOCAL)

If you need a read and can't make it to the Library, check one of FOCAL's three Little Free Libraries located at the Cary Park District Community Center, Krause Senior Center, and Greenfields Park.

FOCAL has contributed \$141,603.10 to the Library since the volunteer group began in the mid-1990s. They have funded special projects, equipment, and programs that are outside of the Library's budget such as the new Teen Area furniture, a large format printer, Summer Reading finishing prize books, and much more. - One-time sign-up: once you've signed up, you're set for this program and any future program you want to participate in
- Easily enter the book you're reading by scanning its barcode
- You do not need to log specific titles—just select Log a Day, Minutes, or Pages Only
- The app offers a built-in timer to track your reading and see your real-time stats
- If you're reading an audiobook, just add the stated time length
- Parents/caregivers can register their child(ren) and then log everyone's reading (parents and each child) with just a couple of clicks
- Parents/caregivers with multiple children can log each child's minutes quickly by selecting all the readers in the app

"History is a passion of mine, but even more I love to excite interest in a new topic. Also, I especially love the interaction with library patrons."

Q: *How long have you been doing portrayals?* A: Since 2013. I began with Meet Marie Antoinette and grew into educational entertainment from there.

Q: *How do you choose and research your subjects?*

A: I use what I call a literary 'spine'—that is, I use one book as a source of information and then branch out my research based on what I found in the spine, and so expand my resources. It is extremely important to me to be accurate as I weave facts into a live presentation.

Q: *How long does it take you to develop your programs?* A: I enjoy losing myself in the process. I plan in terms of months. It begins with research, then the script, the images are collected, after that assembly, back to script and the refining process, next rehearsals, while that is happening the costume is determined and materials for it collected. My wonderfully talented mother helps me with all my costumes. Getting ready on an individual day also varies. Cleopatra, for example takes an hour just for the makeup.

Q: *Which portrayal is your favorite?*

A: The truth is, my favorite character to perform is whichever one I'm doing that day. From content review, to rehearsal, to performance, the character I am doing that day has 100% of my attention and focus. Then the next day someone new is in my head!
