Get the most out of the online catalog and your account.

Don't have a library card or not sure how to access your account?

If you live within the CAPL district, you can apply for a library card online. If you're not sure whether you're in our district, check your tax bill or view our boundary map online. Instructions for how to log onto your account for the first time can be found on our website | caryarealibrary.org/getcard

Place holds

Place holds on items that are checked out or not owned by CAPL. We have access to hundreds of thousands of materials from 27 other area libraries through our shared catalog. You can choose to search "Cary Materials" or "All Member Libraries" in the Limit By filter.

Choose your hold pick up location

You can pick up your holds in the building from our self-serve shelving near our Service Center or you can specify pick up for one (or all) of your holds through our Drive-thru window as you place the hold.

Schedule/suspend your holds

If you don't want or need an item quite yet, or want to space out your holds to arrive so you're not overwhelmed, you can schedule when your holds activate. This is a convenient feature if you travel and need to suspend a hold until you return home.

Three ways to receive alerts

Receive hold pick up and overdue notices via phone, email, or text. Set this preference under My Record > Contact Information and Preferences.



Create lists

Create and keep lists of titles you're interested in or need to reference again. Add titles to a list by clicking the "Add to List" link in the item description.

Keep track of your reading history

Track your reading history simply by checking a box in your account preferences (My Record > Contact Information and Preferences).

Suggest a purchase

If you can't find a specific title in our or the other libraries' collections you can suggest that we purchase the title for our collection | **caryarealibrary.org**/ **suggest-a-purchase**

Auto-renewals

The majority of our materials auto-renew twice. Exceptions include materials that have holds pending, the Library of Things collection, and STEM Kits. Don't forget that we are also fine free!
